- **DO NOT** change your mind once you have started answering the questions, or you will waste lots of time.


2. Arrange the time carefully

3. Underline key words of the questions



- What are the reasons leading to high percentage of undernourished population in Africa?
- Can you suggest some possible measures to cope with the problem of famine in Africa?
- Can you tell the disadvantages of introducing genetically modified (GM) food to famine-stricken countries?
- How effective those international aids are in handling the problem of famine?
- What are the actions taken by global citizens with regard to the problem of famine?







